






We continue to develop our friendship with peers from Silverdale School as we have used instruments to make high and low notes.

Upper School

This term the pupils in Upper School have been very busy accessing different activities in the community. Some of us have visited Network Wheels at Salt Ayre each week to develop our cycling skills using the many adapted trikes on offer, whilst another group of pupils have been enjoying music sessions at More Music led by Boogie Bill. They've had a great time playing the different instruments and watching live performances.











In school, the pupils have enjoyed having their Functional Skills lessons enhanced by visiting Saxophonist Arran. He plays along as the pupils play number games. The music adds to the sense of anticipation the pupils feel as they watch their friends take their turn and wait to see who will win.

Bleasdale Brews – our pop up café, run by students as an enterprise project – continues to attract a good turnout each week. Students practice the skills needed for adulthood by greeting customers, taking and preparing their orders and washing up afterwards. The café runs every Wednesday during term time from 10.00 – 11.30 am and everyone is very welcome.

Music Programme in School

The pupils are really enjoying our bespoke music programme. Every Tuesday we are joined by Arran Kent who is a professional saxophonist. Arran plays his saxophone within lessons to enhance our learning and the lesson. In Lower School he plays a variety of animal sounds to complement the work they are doing on the farm. In Middle School he plays different music for different colours as pupils use art to express themselves and sort happy and sad images. In Upper School he plays different music to support the art lesson.







Parents' Group

Our Parents' Group meets every Tuesday between 9.30 and 11.00 am in school. This is a chance for parents to get to know each other in an informal setting over a cuppa and a biscuit and form new friendships and share ideas. It is organised by one of our HLTAs Jo and representatives from our Therapy Team plan to drop in and meet parents during future sessions. Everyone is very welcome and we have a box of toys for younger siblings or grandchildren.

After School Clubs



We have continued to run three After School Clubs each week for different age groups. On Mondays students from Upper School have been practising their physical skills in the PE Hall. This term they have been doing yoga and working on repeating skills alongside their peers. As the weather improves, they will be going outside



to work on the bikes and trikes and our Physios will be coming to watch and assess them. Lower School pupils have the opportunity to have fun in our warm water pool on Wednesdays and on Thursdays we have been running a food preparation club for pupils from Middle School. We vary the pupils who attend each club over the course of the year to try and make sure that as many as possible have the chance to participate. There is no charge for taking part and, in some circumstances, we are able to offer transport home as well for a small contribution.

Transitions Event

On the 23rd March, we hosted our first Transitions Event in school, with lots of different providers coming in to share information with our parents about what's available once their young people leave school. Everyone really enjoyed the event and we had lots of positive feedback. Some of our pupils who work in Bleasdale Brews even visited to make all our stallholders cups of tea and coffee. We can't wait to invite everyone back and see what other exciting opportunities we can find to share with you next year.





World Book Day

For World Book Day this year we all studied the book "You must wear a hat". School bought hats for every pupil to decorate as part of their homework. On the day itself, they followed a sensory trail through school while wearing their hats.















Red Nose Day

For this year's Red Nose Day we used the theme of the Little Mr Men and Little Misses and, using Mr Jelly, we held a "Jellyathon" taking part in all things linked to jelly. We used Mr Bounce and Little Miss Somersault to take part in a sponsored bounce. Mr Tickle was used to make everyone laugh and Mr Bump to practice our first aid skills. Focus on Aquatic Learning – Sally Gardner, Aquatic Learning Co-ordinator

At Bleasdale we use the Swimming pool as another classroom - simply a water-based classroom used for Aquatic learning.

In the pool pupils have targets to work towards just like they would in class that are linked to either their classroom targets or of those of accredited swimming bodies learning the pre-requisites of swimming and water safety. The targets are set after a discussion between teachers and the aquatic coordinator to ensure that all learning environments are in sync and the safety and progression of each pupil is paramount.

With the pool being warm it can allow pupils to relax their muscles and often then they can do things such as lower their arms, move their legs which they couldn't do on dry land. There are many benefits to aquatic learning including improved coordination and balance, reduced pain to tight muscles or increases flexibility in joints. It has also allowed those to practise weight bearing when they can't normally.

The water allows the freedom to float and move without any restrictions which is a rare experience in everyday life. With this freedom pupils can become more confident at communicating in whichever way they prefer, whether this be using vocalisations to ask for more or showing very clearly whether they like something or they don't.

Aquatic learning is very diverse in that you can change the environment from the sea to the rainforest by changing the lights, music and activities. We can also make the session a very calm and relaxing session to support the relaxation on the body or make it very lively and busy to promote independent movement or team work.









Communication Workshop

The Communication Group organised a workshop for parents around the subject of objects of reference and introducing them into home routines. We have recently introduced some new objects of reference within school, such as a mortar board for Kirsty's office and a multi coloured pen for the main school office.
